Finding Her Voice

DESIREE'S STORY

Desiree's early life was marked by instability. Her mother was unable to care for her, and as a result, Desiree spent much of her childhood and teenage years moving in and out of foster homes and shelters. She describes that season of her life as very rough.

When Desiree first came to Christ's Home in Warminster, PA, she was extremely nervous. Meeting new people felt overwhelming, and she was shy and afraid to be herself. But over time—through the support of staff and the friendships she formed with other teens in the Transitional Living Program—Desiree began to change. She discovered that beneath her quiet exterior was an outgoing side she never fully embraced, and she slowly began opening herself up to new relationships.

The greatest impact Christ's Home had on Desiree's life was the guidance of the staff, who helped her sort through her path forward and avoid returning to the people, places, and habits that had once led her astray. Before coming to Christ's Home, Desiree often found herself in trouble, coping with her pain through fighting, smoking, and drinking. At Christ's Home, those were no longer options. Instead, she was encouraged to confront the internal chaos from her past and begin facing life in healthier ways.

A significant turning point for Desiree was her faith journey. Prior to coming to Christ's Home, she did not believe in God. But after attending a local church with a few staff members, she discovered that Sundays brought comfort and hope. Church became a source of strength, helping her feel more prepared to face each new week.

As Desiree continued to grow, she found a job at a local grocery store and began enjoying simple joys like trips to the beach and the water park with friends she made at Christ's Home. When she went through a difficult breakup, one she knew was necessary but still painful, those same friends and staff surrounded her with support. Without them, she admits she may not have handled that season well.

During her three years at Christ's Home, Desiree experienced remarkable growth. She became more confident and talkative, leaving her shy self behind. She learned that her voice mattered and became unafraid to be herself.

She also gained practical life skills, including how to keep her apartment clean and save money for her future.

This winter, Desiree took a big step forward, moving into her own apartment. She is now preparing to start barber school, with dreams

of one day opening her own shop. While leaving Christ’s Home was bittersweet, Desiree shared that she knows every ending brings a new beginning and she is ready for what’s next.

Right Where We're Meant to Be:

JOHN & SUSAN HENDRICKS FIND HOME AT CHRIST'S HOME

After just one year at Christ's Home Retirement Community, independent living residents John and Susan Hendricks are confident they made the right decision at just the right time.

Lifelong residents of Montgomery and Bucks County, John and Susan have built their lives around family, faith, and community. John, a graduate of East Stroudsburg University, spent his career in engineering document control, while Susan grew up in Lansdale, where she developed a deep appreciation for connection and belonging, which is something that continues to shape her life today.



Their journey to Christ's Home began through John's mother, Betty, who was admitted for rehabilitation. In 2018, Betty and her husband, Charley Beifuss, moved into the suites on campus. Witnessing the care and compassion she received left a lasting impression and ultimately led John and Susan to consider Christ's Home for themselves.

"We toured the campus and just felt this was where we wanted to be," they shared. When the right cottage became available in 2025, just a few miles from their longtime home, they knew the timing was right.

Although some people told them they were "too young" to move into a retirement community, John and Susan see it differently. Today, they are living independently in a beautiful neighborhood, surrounded by opportunities, friendships, and a strong sense of community while enjoying more time together to build new memories in the next chapter of their lives.

Since settling in, they have embraced all that Christ's Home has to offer. From peaceful walks around campus to time spent by the pond, the beauty of the surroundings has become part of their daily rhythm. One of their favorite simple joys is watching the abundant wildlife: birds, deer, geese, ducks, and even the occasional fox just outside their windows.

Their days are filled with both activity and connection.

For the Hendricks, one of the greatest gifts of living at Christ’s Home is peace of mind. Knowing that additional levels of care are available if ever needed allows them to fully enjoy independent living today, without worrying about what tomorrow may bring.

They also appreciate the freedom that comes with maintenance-free living, especially after years of caring for a home. “With all the snow this past winter, it was nice knowing we didn’t have to shovel,” they shared with a smile.

When asked what advice they would offer to someone considering a move to a retirement community, their answer is simple: start early. “Come tour, meet people, and get your name on the waiting list. It really helps you make the best decision when the time comes.”

Looking back, John and Susan feel certain they didn’t just find a place to live—they found a place to belong. A place where they can continue building memories, deepening relationships, and enjoying life together.
