A Century of Living

CELEBRATING LIVES OF MEANING, FRIENDSHIP, AND FAMILY AT CHRIST'S HOME

At Christ's Home, we are privileged to celebrate remarkable lives that span more than a century. Lives filled with resilience, purpose, and connection. Among these extraordinary individuals are Carolyn and Marion, whose stories reflect not only longevity, but the impact of family, friendship, and community.

Carolyn (age 105): Friendship, Creativity, and Community

Born in Philadelphia in 1921, Carolyn grew up with two brothers and one sister. She attended Girls High, one of the first all-women's public high schools in the country, before continuing her education in business school. Upon graduation, Carolyn began her career as a secretary for a florist shop, where she worked for several years.

At age 37, Carolyn met her husband William, marking the start of a loving partnership. Together, they raised two sons, William and Victor. Throughout her life, Carolyn remained engaged in her community, especially through the Questers Antiques Club, where she proudly served as president three times.

In her free time, Carolyn expressed her creativity through watercolor painting and embroidery. When reflecting on what matters most in life, Carolyn shared a message that continues to resonate: ***"Be friendly, make friends, and keep your friends. They help a lot during life."***

Marion (age 102): Family, Service, and Compassion

Marion was also born in Philadelphia, where her father owned a neighborhood grocery store. Growing up alongside one brother, she developed a strong sense of family and responsibility.

At just 18 years old, Marion began working for the government in a clerical role. She met her husband Alfred at a house party when she was 19. After his service in the war, they married when Marion was 24 and went on to raise their son, Stephan.

Marion dedicated much of her time to helping others. She volunteered for several years at Juniata Hospital's gift shop and was an active member of the B'rith Women's Club. She also cherished time spent with her family, especially on their trips to the Pocono Mountains.

When asked to share her wisdom, Marion offered a simple, humble response: ***"I wouldn't."*** In that answer lies a lifetime of experience, grace, and authenticity.

Building Community and Healthy Habits with the Wellness Team

The Wellness Team at Christ's Home is thriving and helping Independent Living residents stay healthy, busy, make connections, and most importantly have fun in retirement.

Led by Wellness Nurses Alicia Ferry and Eileen Felicetti, the wellness program at Christ's Home features a wide array of exercises that incorporate the mind, body, and soul. These include group gym sessions, balance classes, diet workshops featuring healthy dishes, wellness walks at local parks, and mindful minute meditations, which takes place three times per week and gives residents an opportunity to practice nervous system regulation techniques and breathing techniques.

"We are continuing to grow and we are continuing to evolve, and it's a beautiful thing to watch and be a part of," Alicia said. "We are really teaching our residents a healthy quality of life, and how to heal, and how to do techniques and things that will help them extend their quality of life. There's just a lot going on that is bringing more life to this campus."

Not only does the wellness program encompass physical health, but it also takes a more holistic approach and includes mental health, diet, and social health to increase their overall wellbeing and bring joy into their lives.

Through these amazing events offered at Christ's Home, the wellness program has become more than a way for residents to stay healthy and busy. It has created an exciting sense of community and gives residents something to circle on their calendar on a daily basis.

"When we do things with our Independent Living residents for wellness, it brings everyone together from all of the different sectors of living here, so it absolutely creates community."

One wellness event that has captured the interest of residents is the Blue Zone Series. A blue zone is defined as an area of the globe where senior adults tend to live the longest due to their quality of life. Think places like Sardinia, Italy; Icaria, Greece; and Okinawa, Japan.

Alicia's goal, with the help of the entire wellness team, is to turn Christ's Home into a blue zone. Through her six-part series, residents learn about blue zones and participate in an exercise that mirrors the lifestyles of senior adults living in a blue zone region. Future blue zone events include walks on the retirement campus and Mediterranean diet inspired dinners. The power of community, healthy living, and most importantly faith have played a vital role in turning this goal into a reality and ensuring all residents live a long and happy retirement.

"Part of longevity is finding your purpose and knowing why you're here, that's part of what makes the blue zones the blue zones, and I think that's what we're doing here at Christ's Home."

Despite all the waves of success the wellness team has accomplished, work doesn't feel like work for Alicia.

"I don't feel like I work every day—I'm here to serve them, and that's my mission. It's amazing to see the growth these residents have made and their ability to learn. They want to learn more and do more, so that's what drives me every day."

Like many couples, they visited numerous retirement communities. While many offered attractive amenities, none felt quite right.

“When we came to Christ’s Home, it just felt right,” Scott said. “The people, the grounds, and the atmosphere touched our hearts.”

One of the biggest attractions was the independent living cottages. The couple was able to personalize their cottage before moving in, making the transition from their larger home much easier.

“We downsized, but it still feels like home,” Scott shared.

Today, they enjoy the freedom of maintenance-free living. Lawn care, repairs, and routine upkeep are all handled by Christ’s Home, allowing them more time to enjoy life. Scott regularly uses the fitness center, while Susan enjoys swimming in the indoor heated pool. Dining options, on-site services, and access to future care provide additional peace of mind.



“We feel cared for here,” Scott said. “Christ’s Home has the staff and services to help us age without putting stress on our children.”

Their faith also played an important role in their decision.

“Our faith is very important to us,” Susan said. “We’ve found great comfort in being part of a community where people are comfortable sharing their faith and encouraging one another.”

Today, Scott and Susan often tell friends who are considering a move not to wait too long.

“Do it before you need to do it,” Scott advises.

Looking back, they have never questioned their decision.

“We fit in, we’re comfortable, and we’re happy,” Scott said. “Being here is truly a blessing.”

More Than Pickleball:

HOW CROSS COURT IS REACHING THE NEXT GENERATION

Several years ago, a generous Christ's Home supporter shared a burden that was weighing heavily on their heart. They were concerned about the younger generation and the unique challenges they face in today's world: loneliness, isolation, depression, anxiety, and a growing lack of meaningful connection.



This generation grew up during the isolation of the COVID-19 pandemic, and in a world where technology makes communication easier than ever yet often replaces genuine face-to-face relationships. This donor recognized a growing need among them to feel truly connected. For many young adults, weekends can magnify feelings of loneliness when meaningful opportunities for community are limited. They also understood that beneath the desire for connection lies an even deeper longing—a longing for truth, purpose, belonging, and relationships that genuinely matter.

With a desire to make a difference, they invested in a new Saturday night ministry at Christ's Home Community Center called **Cross Court Pickleball**. The purpose of Cross Court is to bring young adults together in a fun, welcoming environment where shared values and faith foster meaningful connections.

What began as a simple gathering has grown into a thriving community for young adults in their 20s and 30s. Over the past two years, more than 240 young adults from our local community have participated in Cross Court events and activities. Participants have enjoyed coffee houses, black-light pickleball nights, tournaments, potluck dinners, cookouts, and meaningful conversations that extend far beyond the court. While pickleball may have been the starting point, Cross Court has become much more than a game. It has become a place where friendships are formed, faith is explored, and lives are impacted.

We are excited to see how God continues to use Cross Court to reach the next generation and create lasting impact throughout our community.

Finding His Way

KADE'S JOURNEY

When Kade first arrived at Christ's Home in Paradise, PA, life felt uncertain. Before coming to the program, he described his world as "a mess" and said he often felt like things were spinning out of control. After time in another group home, Kade realized he needed a new environment, one that could offer the guidance, stability, and support he was searching for. That search led him to Christ's Home.



Like many young people stepping into a new chapter, Kade carried both excitement and apprehension. He was nervous about confronting parts of his past, particularly experiences that had made it difficult for him to trust others. Yet he also felt a sense of anticipation. He hoped this new place might offer a fresh start and an opportunity to discover what God had in store for his life.

Over time, Kade began to grow in ways he hadn't expected. One of the most important lessons he has learned is that it's okay not to

have every answer right away. Instead, he has learned to trust the people God places in his life and to lean on that support when the road feels uncertain. Staff members and mentors played an important role in that journey. Kade especially remembers the guidance of Mr. Joel, who took the time to listen and help him process difficult experiences from his past. Through conversations and encouragement, Kade found space to reflect, heal, and move forward.

Daily life at Christ's Home gave Kade structure and community. Mornings often began with meals shared together and prayer. During the week he worked toward building his independence, holding a job, planning for the future, and searching for a place of his own. In his free time, he enjoyed simple moments like playing video games or spending time with others in the house. Sundays often meant attending church, a rhythm that helped anchor his faith.

Beyond the routines, it was the sense of belonging that left the deepest impression. Kade recalls how the staff and other residents supported him through challenges, encouraged him as he prepared for independence, and even helped him learn everyday life skills like cooking. Though he was older than some of the others, he says they treated him like family.

Some of Kade's most cherished memories are also the simplest ones. Celebrating Christmas

and his birthday at Christ’s Home meant a great deal to him. Sharing meals, watching movies, and enjoying time together created moments that felt like being part of a loving family—something he treasures deeply.

Today, Kade reflects on how much he has grown during his time at Christ’s Home. His faith has deepened, and he has gained confidence that he can face life’s challenges. Even when plans didn’t always unfold the way he expected, he believes God continued to guide him, providing a temporary home, meaningful relationships, a job, and eventually a place of his own.

On difficult days, Kade reminds himself how far he has already come. Looking back at his journey gives him the motivation to keep moving forward. “You can’t quit yet,” he tells himself.

As he looks toward the future, Kade hopes to build a successful life with God at the center. More than that, he hopes to help others along the way, offering the same kind of encouragement and support that helped him.

Kade is honest about the challenges he still faces. Like many people, he sometimes wrestles with overthinking or moments of doubt. But he has learned an important truth: he doesn’t have to face those struggles alone. Instead of focusing on what feels overwhelming, he tries to focus on the good that God continues to place in his life.

His story is one of resilience, growth, and hope. It’s a reminder that when young people are given stability, encouragement, and people who truly care, they can begin to see a new future for themselves.
